Starting in Cork, one of Europe's great trading cities for over 1,000 years, this tour explores the rich diversity of Ireland's Ancient East. Explore the pathways of Medieval Ireland, from Viking Waterford – Ireland's oldest city – to the iconic Rock of Cashel, which looms dramatically above a rolling green landscape. This is where ancient Gaelic kings chose as their throne and which was later transformed into one of Ireland's greatest monastic sites.

Villages along the way host festivals of food, culture and heritage throughout the year and are the jumping off points of tours of all kind - on foot or on horseback, by car, boat or barge. Let your imagination take flight amongst the walls of our castles and historic abbeys which await your discovery around every bend.

You will leave not only refreshed but illuminated by these many ancient wonders and the stories of how they came to this rich land and how Irish life today has been shaped by their immensely powerful influence.

АМ	Welcome to the city of Cork or as locals call it - 'the real capital' of Ireland! It's a city rich in history and tradition yet increasingly urbane and sophisticated. It has been hugely influenced by its harbour and maritime and merchant heritage.  First stop should be Cork's beloved <b>English</b> Market. This enclosed market is a gourmet hub, selling fresh produce, organic meats, baked delicacies and speciality cheeses. This evocative, haunting experience will leave you with memories of what it must have been like for the passengers who boarded the Titanic in Cobh. РМ	Lismore is a medieval castle located in the beautiful countryside of Waterford. Prepare to be stunned by the almost magical setting of this beautiful castle. This is a place for great photographs. Spread over nearly three hectares, the Lismore Castle Gardens are divided into two very distinct and different halves. The Upper Garden is a complete example of the seventeenth century walled garden first constructed here by Richard Boyle, the First Earl of Cork, in about 1605. The outer walls and terraces remain and the plantings have changed to match the tastes of those living within the castle. The Lower Garden was mostly created in the nineteenth century for the Sixth Duke of Devonshire. Guided tours with the Gardener are available. From the ancient Rock of Cashel, you'll drive to see the remnants of the Land of Saints and Scholars in Holycross. This is a special place, old and rich with history, peaceful and beautiful. Holycross Abbey was founded in 1168 by the King of Munster. A particle of the True Cross was enshrined in the abbey where it still remains today. For 800 years Holycross was one of the most frequented places of pilgrimage in Ireland. Holycross is still a place of worship for the local community. It is a delightful 'cottage orné' built in the early 1800s by Richard Butler, 1st Earl of Glengall to a design by the famous Regency architect John Nash. It looks as if it came straight from a children's book of fairy tales. Its interior contains a graceful spiral staircase and some elegantly decorated rooms. Marvel at the wallpaper in the salon, one of the first commercially-produced Parisian wallpapers manufactured by the Dufour factory.
