

Trail Treats

- BALBRIGGAN**
This fishing town is now known for its castle, lighthouse and coastal walks, but was historically famous for textile manufacturing, particularly hosiery – even Queen Victoria wore Balbriggan-made stockings!
- SKERRIES**
St Patrick left his footprint on a rock here after leaping from a nearby island – see if you can track it down.
- DONABATE**
Here you'll find Newbridge House and Farm, one of Ireland's best preserved Georgian mansions. Alongside fascinating history, there are beautiful gardens, a state-of-the-art kitchen and a working farm on site.
- MALAHIDE**
Malahide Castle is a treasure trove of heritage and historical tales, with its rooms echoing different styles and tastes from centuries past.
- HOWTH**
Hidden in the heart of Howth is 'Aideen's Grave', a massive dolmen reputedly the burial place of a mythical princess.
- RAHENY**
Check out the Tree of Life, a dying 200-year-old Monterey Cypress reborn as a spectacular sculpture.
- BULL ISLAND**
Dollymount Strand is a vast expanse of sand that's the perfect launch pad for kite surfers or simply stretching your legs.
- CLONTARF**
Look out for the unique birds and marine life that call Clontarf home. Part of the UNESCO Dublin Bay Biosphere, this is the perfect place for a stroll or cycle.
- DUBLIN PORT**
Sit and watch the ships coming into the bustling port, guided by Dublin's iconic cherry red landmark – the Poolbeg Lighthouse at the end of the Great South Wall.
- GRAND CANAL DOCK**
Strut your stuff on the city's "red carpet" at Grand Canal Dock, a paved red runway decorated with eye-catching glowing light sticks.
- SANDYMOUNT**
Ireland and Mexico's friendship is marked here with a 20 foot sculpture called Awaiting the Mariner, although Dublin has nicknamed it An Cailín Bán (the white girl)!
- BLACKROCK**
Treasure hunters at the ready! Blackrock's weekend market is Dublin's oldest market with over 30 stalls of antiques, clothes, furniture, food and some quirky cafés.
- SALTHILL & MONKSTOWN**
Peckish? Discover why Monkstown has earned a reputation as a home-from-home for hungry gastronomes.
- DÚN LAOGHAIRE**
Amble along the 1.2km harbour wall and let bracing sea breezes work their magic.
- SANDYCOVE & GLASTHULE**
There are no medals for taking a dip at the Forty Foot – but when temperatures drop, there probably should be!
- DALKEY**
Once a mighty stronghold built to defend the port's valuable cargo, Dalkey Castle is now home to a Writer's Gallery that commemorates Dublin's best storytellers.
- KILLINEY**
Can you see Wales? On a clear day it's as clear as day from the top of Killiney Hill.

BALDOYLE TO PORTMARNOCK

While some on-road cycling is required between Howth and Malahide, a 1.8 km dedicated cycleway from Baldoyle to Portmarnock is reserved for cyclists and pedestrians.



CITY CENTRE TO HOWTH

A dedicated cycle path runs along the North Liffey Quay, from Buckingham Street to the Clontarf Strand and on for the next 10 km or so.



THE TOLKA ESTUARY GREENWAY

With over 3kms of spectacular views across Dublin Bay, this dedicated cycle and pedestrian route takes you on a journey around the northern side of Dublin Port.



BOOTERTOWN TO BLACKROCK

Starting at Blackrock Park beside Bootertown Dart station, the route continues through the park and exits the park at Blackrock Dart station.



GLASTHULE TO DALKEY

A shared pedestrian and cycle route, 'The Metals' runs for approximately 2 km between the seafront at Glasthule and Dalkey.

Dollymount Beach

Dollymount Strand is the closest large beach to Dublin city centre. It is situated on Bull Island which was created in the 19th century in Dublin Bay to deal with silting problems. The sandy beach runs along the full 5 kilometre length of the island. Today, it is an important UNESCO designated Biosphere nature reserve, being a breeding site for many bird species and one of the most protected areas in Ireland.

The Diving Bell

Substation

Its renovation uncovered part of the city's original 1728 sea wall beneath the building, now preserved under glass, offering visitors a unique glimpse into Dublin's layered maritime past.

The Pumphouse formerly housed the steam engine which powered the gates of Graving Dock 1 has been repurposed by Dublin Port into an artistic and cultural venue and is a key part of the Heritage Zone at Dublin Port.

Great South Wall

As one of the oldest and longest sea walls in Europe, the Great South Wall is a popular tourist attraction and one of Dublin's most visited walks, welcoming 80,000 visitors per year. Remarkably the wall still stands in its original form, protecting the channel to Dublin Port and facilitating the safe passage of commercial shipping which accounts for at least 60% of Ireland's imports.
